He has performed across the country as musical director/pianist for Cook, Dixon and Young (formerly of the Three Mo' Tenors) and has been blessed to work with some of the world's finest musicians including Robert Shaw, Margaret Hillis, Brazeal Dennard, Minister Thomas Whitfield, Aretha Franklin, Anita Baker, George Shirley, Marcus Belgrave, Jack Jones, Stephanie Mills and Tramaine Hawkins.
